
Symposium Day, Winter 2016



The department was well represented during last term's Symposium day. Three of our professors were involved in the <u>Celebration of Learning</u> at Augustana, sharing information on a variety of different topics.

Dr. Carter, along with Dr. Burnham gave a talk on making Climate Justice a Reality. They hosted a screening of the documentary *This Changes Everything: Capitalism vs the Climate*, based on Naomi Klein's best-selling book of the same name. Approximately 30 students attended to watch this powerful film about global climate activism. Following the film, they facilitated a short discussion with audience members about local climate justice efforts.

Dr. Kaul co-led a session with Danny Kim Lee, Assistant Director of International Student Life, about the affects of tourism. Their session focused on tips to better appreciate and understand the positionality of travelling. They also focused on 'voluntourism' what that means and how it can be problematic. Looking at many of the study



away trips critically and with ethics in mind can broaden our understanding of what it means to go there as students, Americans, and privileged peoples. Danny Kim Lee reflected on "service learning trips" he's lead in Asunción, Paraguay. Dr. Kaul will be thinking about this on his own trip to Greece this summer with Augie students.

World Anthropology Day occurs every year on February 18th. It is a time to celebrate the contributions the discipline has made to our understanding of humanity, and to making the world safe for cultural diversity. Because World Anthropology Day happened during Augustana's winter term finals week this year, we decided to delay our event this year and held it on March 17th. We ordered pizzas and watched a new award-winning documentary called "The Anthropologist."

We also heard from several anthropology faculty and students, past and present, who talked about their research projects and how an anthropological perspective has helped them. They illustrated the wide range of research possibilities. We also heard from an anthropology alum, Brooke Armstrong, who used her anthropological knowledge and skills when living and working abroad in Japan. Now, she is heading off to the School of Oriental and African Studies in London, England for her master's degree.

Dr. Carter's Class Fieldtrip

On April 9th, students in Dr. Carter's Ecofeminism and Globalization course joined with classes taught by Dr. Strunk (Geography) and Dr. Leech (History) to learn more about the intersections of urban agriculture and community development in Cedar Rapids, IA. The field trip first stopped by Matthew 25, where Eric Christianson, the farm production manager, took the group on a tour of the community center and urban gardens. The class learned how the organization engaged in the 2008 flood recovery and has continued to provide support and space for community revitalization projects. The trip then stopped at the headquarters of Feed Iowa First, a nonprofit dedicated to building food security and educating new and beginning farmers within the Cedar Rapids community. Feed Iowa First's executive director, Sonia Kendrick, shared her personal path as a war veteran, and now farmer, concerned about the availability and quality of our food. The group then stopped at NewBo City Market, a hub for local vendors and restaurants, for lunch.

1st African Diaspora Mock Dig In Augustana's History Gains Major Attention

Today marked the first time in Augustana history that students conducted a mock archaeological excavation as part of Augustana's Spring Symposium called the Celebration of Learning. During this symposium event, students from the course "Archaeology and History of the African Diaspora" conducted a public excavation experience to showcase the world of African Diaspora archaeology in action. In addition to this excavation experience, the students also exhibited a poster entitled "10 Things You Didn't Know About African Diaspora Archaeology", displayed their own individual research from different African Diaspora sites, and connected live with students in the Virgin Islands through Skype. The students were set up at 4 different stations: digging station, sifting station, documentation station, and public outreach station. The organization of this experience was intentional



to provide an opportunity for every student to rotate through each station and experience all of the moving parts as well as the level of teamwork required in conducting a real archaeological excavation. Here are some highlights from each station.

DIGGING STATION

Digging in 10 cm levels was more challenging than they thought it would be but at this station they

learned how to excavate carefully with their trowels, record depth measurements, and perform a clean sweep of their units.





SIFTING STATION

The artifacts were sifted carefully using a 1/4 inch mesh screen and bagged for later sorting and analysis, as part of the post-excavation processing, which the students learned about in class

the next day.



DOCUMENTATION STATION

Documenting the site included filling out site level forms, preparing artifact bags, taking pictures, and examining soil colors and texture.





PUBLIC OUTREACH STATION

We engaged with over 50 visitors on site and several students in the Virgin Islands through our mock dig. This station also included an exhibition of student work as each student selected their own African Diaspora archaeology site to investigate and write up a summary. Each site selection is different and gave visitors a sense of the diversity of sites that fall under the umbrella of the African Diaspora.

"On TV, it is more of a treasure hunt. I have learned now that archaeology is more of a methodological approach and not a treasure hunt" -D.C.

"We weren't looking for gold but for artifacts that can provide evidence of a historical moment and culture. Excavating is not just the act of digging but a team effort." -B.D.

"It takes time to plan a dig, and afterwards complete your analysis upon a site. The dig brought to light that there are actually archaeological teams who excavate sites, and not just one lone archaeologist in a bucket hat" -A.P.

"In completing the excavation, we learned how difficult and structured an actual excavation can be, as well as how important it is to have a strong team helping. It is not possible to do it all alone and the film industry does a horrible representation of archaeology. This was an amazing and unique experience." -B.G.





Kirn Book Award 2016

Dr. Michael Kirn (1944-2008) and his wife Dr. Mary Kirn worked at Augustana for 27 years. He taught philosophy and political science before gradually moving into

administration. After serving as director of freshman advising and orientation, he became director of records in 1984. Dr. Kirn continued to teach political science until a few years before his retirement in 2004. An avid reader, Dr. Kirn owned an extensive personal library of fiction and non-fiction books. He created "book lists" of books he wanted to read based on reviews in The New York *Review of Books* and the *New York Times* Sunday Book Review. He believed that a liberally educated person needed to read both broadly and in-depth. The book award was established in his memory by his wife and daughter. Applicants are asked to submit a one-page list of ap-



proximately 25 fiction and/or non-fiction books they would like to own, with a brief paragraph indicating why they have chosen those books. All students are invited to submit applications, but they should indicate an interest in/appreciation of one or more of the disciplines that meant the most to Dr. Kirn: anthropology, classics, history, philosophy, political science and sociology. Just as Dr. Kirn kept a list of books that he wanted to read, you too can be keeping a list of books for next year's award! **Congratulations to this years winners: Amanda Schar and Kathryn Gorzek!**
