Augustana students will be given an opportunity on Wednesday, Feb. 26, to express their concern in the civil rights issue by voluntarily abstaining from their dinner meal. The money thus saved by the Augustana Food Service Department will be sent to the United States National Student Association in an effort to help unemployed Southern Negroes who are not receiving their state and federal aid.

For the past few years the Negro situation has been brought to the attention of Augustana students, but participation by students to help better the Negro situation has been nil. During the past school year Mel Pettis and John Griffen have caused student awareness of both the local and national civil rights outlook, but next Wednesday's "Fast for for Freedom Food" will be the first time students have been given the chance on this campus to take part

Varsity Debaters Lose at Dartmouth

Mary Enstrom and Tom Younggren, Augie's senior debaters, advanced to the quarter-finals of the ninth annual varsity invitational debate tournament held this past weekend at Dartmouth College, Hanover, N. H.

The pair won seven out of eight debates in the preliminary rounds but lost to King's College of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., in the quarter-finals.

Another Augustana team, composed of sophomores Allan Rohlfs and David Neubauer, won four and lost four in the same tournament. Eighty teams from 20 states competed in the Dartmouth event.

Augustana sent four other debaters to the 20th annual invitational tournament at Wisconsin State College in Eau Claire. Two eshmen, Peter Scholl and Wiliam Thiemann, placed in the upper 10 in the championship division by winning four out of five lebates. actively in the civil rights fight.

The "Fast for Freedom Food" will be conducted by student organizations on campus throughout the country. The nationwide appeal is sponsored by the United States National Student Association, The Northern Student Movement, and the Student Non-Vio-

lent Coordinating Committee.

Those students wishing to participate in the fast are asked to sign-up at either the noon or supper meal on Friday. A sign-up list will be located at the en-

trances to the food lines. Students are reminded that the fast is completely on an individual basis.

The number of students abstaining from the dinner meal will be multiplied by the raw food cost for each meal in order to determine the amount of money Augustana will contribute to the special fund. After the money has been received by the United States National Student Association, the food will be purchased from a national distributor and then sent to the needy Negroes in the South.
