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## Host High School Debaters This Weekend

# Of Five States

Members of the Augustana Choir, under the direction of Professor Henry Veld, will leave the campus early in April for their annual spring To Obs Staff concert tour. They will travel in chartered buses, and within ten or eleven days will sing nine concerts in five different states, according to Willard Anderson, choir manager.

Tryouts to determine which students will be able to tour with the choir are to be held in the near future, sixty-four to be chosen to participate. Their entire expenses will be paid by the college.

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#### Dr. Bergendoff Takes Lecture Tour Offer

The Augustana campus will be minus its president this spring when Dr. Conrad Bergendoff leaves by or April. He has been invited by there lecturing and conducting seminars in the various German Universities.

Instead of conducting chapel services here at Augustana, Dr. Bergendoff, with the status of a visiting professor, will lecture in both languages to theological students in the universities and will conduct seminars in religious adult education centers.

Dr. Bergendoff's subject will be the relationship of the church to the state, to education, to economics, and to other phases of continental life. He has also been asked to lecture on the ecumenical challenge to Christian communities. As president he is well qualified to speak on such subjects, especially since he was a delegate of the 1937 Oxford and Edinburgh conferences, and was also a member of the committee which met in England one and a half years ago to make plans for the World Council of Churches which convened in Amsterdam last September.

#### Veld To Teach At Michigan U

Mr. Henry Veld has accepted an invitation to teach at the University of Michigan during its summer school session, June 20-August 12 of this year. In addition to teaching classes in choral materials and advanced choral conducting, Mr. Veld will also conduct the university's summer choir.

Dr. Richard K. Johnson, professor of biology at Augustana, has been named president of the National College of Education in Evanston. Dr. Johnson's new appointment will take effect on Sept. 1, at which time, Miss Edna Dean Baker, for 28 years the school's head, will retire.

Dr. Johnson was head of the science department at the National College of Education for eight years before coming to Augustana last fall. From 1946 to 1948 he was vice chairman of the administrative council of the Evanston school.

Dr. Johnson is probably best known for the course he initiated and developed at the National College called Science in the Air Age, which, in one of its phases, allows

an airplane in flight. He is well known in education circles for his advocacy of science education for elementary teachers.

As chairman of the audio-visual aids committee of the National College, he planned exhibit conferences where the most recent audiovisual aid materials were demonstrated to educators of the commun-

The Augustana Invitational High School Debate Tournament will be held here Friday and Saturday of this week. Twenty-five high schools from Iowa and Illinois will participate in the event, which is being directed by Prof. H. J. Holcomb and

the local chapter of Pi Kappa Delta. Two teams, a negative and an affirmative, will represent each school entered, debating on the question, 'Resolved: That the United Nations should be changed to World Government". Each school will be given a total of 12 debates-6 for each team. Winner of the tournament will be determined by the best total score of both teams from each school. Trophies for first and second places will be awarded by the Public Relations Department of Augustana.

All debates will be open to the public. Schedules for each round will be posted in Old Main and the lobby of the library. Debates will be held Friday afternoon and 3:30 and 4:45 and in the evening at 8:15. Debates have also been scheduled for Saturday morning at 8:30, 9:45, and 11:00. In case of a tie for first place, a finite championship debate will be held Saturday afternoon at 2:00.
