



1 cup granulated sugar

1 cup brown sugar

3/4 cup cocoa (dry powder)

3 eggs

1 Tbsp vanilla, 1 tsp salt

1/2 cup melted butter

1 cup flour

Dr. Deb Bracke, associate professor education, offers ideas for youngsters. Her first idea: Have your child cut up a picture book and re-sequence and retell the story. Or, you can mix up the illustrations and have your child put them back in order.

Deb's second idea: Collect small objects and have your child match the object to the word you have written on a baggie. Items one might choose are flowers, pennies, nails, candles, toothpicks, etc. She added: Have your children clean out the cupboard and put the items in alphabetical order.

Ideas from the Experts

Susan Wolf, educational programs coordinator from the Fryxell Geology Museum, says you can learn to make an origami Augiesaurus on YouTube. She suggests searching "How To Make an Easy Origami Dinosaur."

Dr. Rebecca Heick, assistant professor of public health, suggests a Public Health WalkAbout to help kids know that public health is things that keep us healthy and safe in the places we live, play, learn and work. She says, "This is a chance to find examples of public health in our homes and communities. Decide where you would like to do your walkabout - inside or outside. And set a time limit if you like. You can make a list of public health things you see, or even take a picture. As you find examples of public health, talk about how they help to protect and promote health for you, your family, and your community. Think about who is responsible for doing those things and the kinds of jobs they do."
