Augustana graduates are employed in community relations, human resources, social planning, legal professions, marketing, research, criminal justice, and more. Our graduates often make their careers in non-governmental organizations and non-profit sectors, in public health, in museums, education, publishing, or business. Students are prepared for careers in the increasingly complex network of human services, including child and family welfare, health care, counseling, community organizing, policy analysis, and program planning. Augustana's graduates in sociology and anthropology have also attended graduate school in sociology, anthropology, archaeology, museum studies,

public health, law, public administration, social work, criminal justice, education leadership, and counseling.
